

Sometimes People Wonder...

Q. Why does the Indian Springs logo depict an old-fashioned man on a horse (above)?

A. Our logo represents a traveling clergyman who preached in two or more rural places called circuits. The circuit rider traveled, visited people, conducted worship, and established churches approximately mid 1700s - early 1900s. They also performed weddings and served sacraments.

John Wesley and Bishop Francis Asbury were two of history's most prominent circuit riders. They faithfully preached the Wesleyan doctrine of salvation and holiness, traveling thousands of miles annually. This image reminds us of our Wesleyan spiritual heritage.

"What I did on summer vacation..."

When asked to write a story about a summertime experience, Crosby Thorson, age six, wrote about his experience at Indian Springs:



"One day I went to Camp Indian Springs. I went to the kids service. My grandmother went with me. My favorite part was when we went to the mission area. We learned about people who told people that didn't know God about God. And we even got to watch a video about what people did when they were poor and they didn't know God. After the kids service was over we went home. I want to come back next year."

Crosby's grandmother, Sonia Papagan, recalls that Crosby was tentative when taken to the Glenn Tabernacle on the first day. However, he immediately became best buddies with Daniel

Morton, son of Jonathan and Lupita Morton, our OMS missionaries. The boys later became pen pals.

"Crosby had never been to Indian Springs before. He was there for only three days," Sonia said. "The crafts, activities and depth of Bible stories were incredible. Crosby had gone to a famous amusement park that same summer, yet he chose to write about his time at Indian Springs. This experience was very impactful to him."

Crosby lives in Peachtree Corners with his parents and brother Miller who also attended Indian Springs.

Seeing the World through Christ's Eyes

A twenty-five member team journeyed to Honduras this year on a mission trip on behalf of The Lizzie Project. Rhonda Holton, president of Indian Springs Ladies' Fellowship, led the group. The team was made up of 10 members from Indian Springs and 15 members from the Fellowship Evangelical Church (FEC) from Lizella, Georgia. They traveled to Choluteca, Honduras in February before international travel was suspended. The team had remarkable opportunities to minister and serve at the WGM compound managed by

Angie and Larry Overholt.

The Young Adult Ministry of FEC worked for two years to raise \$30,000 to cover travel expenses for their 15 team members. Coordinator Tami Bozeman recalls, "God revealed Himself to our group even before we arrived in Honduras. The entire Lizella community got behind our trip with corporate sponsors giving financial gifts from \$100 - \$1,500. We had weekly

prayer meetings for the trip and three church fundraisers. The trip was fully funded two months before actual departure."

The team's main mission was to distribute backpacks with school supplies to children of various villages. Tami reminisces, "When a child is given a backpack, his or her face lights up. It is a light that changes a person's world perspective."

A Tribute to Rev. Dr. Joe Peabody, Sr.

Indian Springs Trustee



The Indian Springs family lost a faithful servant and trustee on January 27, 2020. Rev. Joe Peabody loved Indian Springs and the Indian Springs community. He served the North Georgia Conference of the United Methodist Church for 52 years.

Joe was born in 1943 and welcomed as the middle child of five sons into a loving, Christian family. The Peabody family had deep roots at Indian Springs Holiness Campground for generations. Joe was grateful for his spiritual heritage and passed his faith on to his own family. He was famous for hosting the preachers on

his porch every year during campmeeting, encouraging them through fellowship and prayer. His commitment to Indian Springs and his love for pastors never wavered.

Joe communicated love and kindness to everyone he encountered. As a trustee on the Indian Springs Board, Joe had a unique ability to speak at critical times, bringing clarity and focus especially when the Board faced challenging decisions. He assisted with the Memorial Service each year with love and compassion. When Indian Springs began the tradition of offering the Lord's Supper on the last Sunday of campmeeting, President Steve Luce chose Joe to preside over the sacrament. This service has become one of the holy moments of campmeeting each year.

A graduate of Emory University and Asbury Theological Seminary, Joe valued higher education and life-long learning. He retired from full-time ministry in 2013 and resided in Conyers, Georgia. Joe was preceded in death by his loving wife Anne. He is survived by his sons, Rev. Joe Peabody, Jr. (Allison) and Rev. Andy Peabody, and grandchildren Parker and Ashton. In addition to his service on the Indian Springs Board, Joe was also active in the Emmaus Community and participated in many leadership matters of the United Methodist Church.

Our campmeeting family will celebrate Joe's life at the Memorial Service during 2021 Campmeeting. We are grateful that Joe's spiritual legacy and love for Indian Springs will live for years to come.


Lessons from Our Memorial Oak Tree

For over one hundred years, a majestic oak tree stood near the present-day location of the Main Tabernacle. The tree had historical significance to Indian Springs, as our four founders knelt under the tree in 1890 and felt God's assurance that they had found the appropriate site to build our campmeeting.

Through the years, the oak tree has symbolized many facets of spiritual growth:

- Oak tree roots extend two and one-half times the tree's height. The root depth gives the tree the ability to withstand the winds of time. Bible study and prayer can become our own roots that hold us firmly in the storms of life.
- Acorns are the fruit of our spiritual journeys. They are symbolic of the thousands of people who have heard and live by the message of heart holiness at Indian Springs.

Sadly, in 1990, the Memorial Oak Tree had to be removed. Many of its acorns were scattered throughout the campground that have become beautiful oak trees today.
